### Introduction

Wearable gadgets, like the Apple Watch and Fitbit, are types of technology that used to only be included in futuristic movies and tv shows. Students will write a persuasive essay convincing someone to buy any wearable technology item.

## Learning Objectives

### Materials Needed

· Images of wearable technology

### Procedure

- 1. Put students in small groups. Tell students to discuss reasons people might give for needing wearable technology, as well as reasons they would not need it. Have each group make a chart with those reasons. Then each group should discuss some arguments against wearable technology.
- 2. Students should then be given time to write a persuasive essay independently on the topic using the following prompt:

Write a persuasive essay telling your audience what wearable technology is and why they need it. Give evidence to support your claim.

#### **Evaluation**

After completing their writing, students can either complete a self-evaluation or exchange papers for a peer-evaluation. Revisions should be made based on this evaluation and then submitted to the teacher for grading.
